As we approach the Easter holidays, I think it is good to look back at the term and celebrate all the wonderful learning experiences the children have had. Absences

Many of you may be planning to book your next family holiday away - perhaps you already have one booked during the Easter break, or maybe you're looking forward to the summer holidays? Some families may be considering a term-time break though, and we'd like to remind you that holidays taken during term-time are *unauthorised absences* unless circumstances are deemed 'exceptional'. (Please ask if you would like clarification on this).

The **Government has published a 'white paper'** where they have set out their priorities for schools over the next few years. One area they are keen to target is attendance. Schools are being asked to closely monitor pupil attendance and to act swiftly when a child's attendance falls below 90%. As a school our attendance levels have always been very good, but we have noticed a drop in our attendance with an increasing number of children being classed as 'persistently absent' – that is, attendance below 90%. Our Attendance Policy can be found on the school website - this explains our policy and procedures for persistent absence.

One of our procedures is to notify all parents and carers if their child's attendance falls below 90%. This includes absences due to illness, and/or any unauthorised absences. If you receive a letter from the school over the next couple of weeks stating that your child's attendance has dropped below 90%, please understand that this is part of our absence monitoring procedure, and within our **duty of care** to ensure children attend school whenever possible. **Our aim is to offer families support so that children's attendance can be improved, and ensure that they have access to teaching and learning on a regular basis.**

It is the responsibility of parents/carers to ensure that all their children of compulsory school age are receiving an efficient, full-time education, by regular attendance at a school or otherwise. Devon County Council monitor this, and support schools in their efforts to raise school attendance. All schools have a legal obligation to inform Devon County Council of any child not attending regularly.

Should you have any concerns about your child's attendance or if you need support, please make an appointment to see me or Mr Smith. Further information about school attendance and absences can be found at: https://www.gov.uk/school-attendance-absence

If your child has unauthorised absences from school it could result in a School Absence Penalty Notice being issued. Safeguarding – County Lines

'County lines' is a term used to describe gangs and organised criminal networks involved in exporting illegal drugs into one or more importing areas using dedicated mobile phone lines or other forms of "deal line". They exploit children to move and store the drugs and money and they will often use coercion, intimidation, violence (including sexual violence) and weapons. Although unusual, it is known that children as young as six are being forced to carry and sell drugs. Young people and children involved with county lines are made to skip school, sleep in drug dens and keep secrets from their loved ones; often feeling trapped in a hopeless situation. Vulnerable adults may also be forced to provide gangs with a base in their homes – this offence is referred to as 'cuckooing'.

Who is vulnerable to county lines exploitation?

- Gangs are increasingly using social media platforms to make initial contact with children and young people as the key method of grooming them to become involved.
- Non-stereotypical children are often targeted as they're perceived as being more likely to evade detection.
- Young people of all genders are being involved: particularly in the age bracket 13-17 years old.

The national picture continues to develop, but it's known that **County Lines gangs do operate in Exmouth**. For example the BBC reported late last year that 18 members of a drug gang used a motorhome to tour the south west, including Exmouth. They were handed prison sentences of up to 12 years.

Signs to look out for: Young people / children caught up in county lines may exhibit some of the following signs, but it is advised that any sudden change of lifestyle should be discussed with them.



- **X** Persistently going missing from home or absent from school
- **X** Significant decline in school performance
- X Isolation from peers / friendship groups
- X Unexplained acquisition of money, shoes/clothes, mobile phones
- **X** Excessive receipt of texts or calls
- X Unexplained injuries or decline in emotional wellbeing.

What to do if you are concerned: County lines and child exploitation must stop, and it is vital that concerns are acted upon immediately to give those who have been exploited a chance for a better future. If you believe a person is at immediate risk of harm, you should contact the police (999). 
