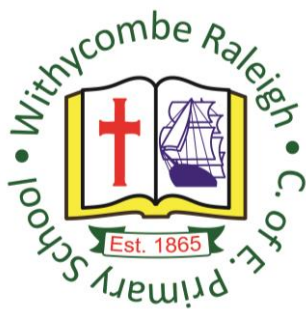

News from your Headteacher

There has been so much going on this term already and we are really pleased that children are enjoying being back in school. School feels very calm and children are settled into the new class routines and expectations.

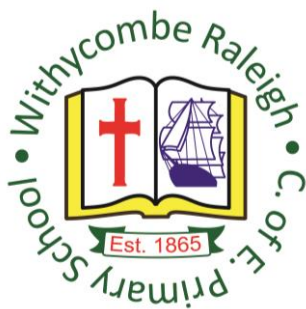
Living so near to the sea, we feel it is vital that children get to make the most of the amazing learning opportunities that our local environment provides. With this in mind we launched 'The Withycombe 60' - Sixty brilliant things to do while at our school. Each year group has a list of interesting activities to work towards, with each class having their own 'postcard' to record when they complete their activities. This week, 180 of our children (Years 5 and 6) took part in the first ever 'Sideshore Sea Safety Project'. This project was set up in collaboration with Swim Devon and Withycombe Raleigh C of E Primary School. The children started their beach sessions with a 'meet the lifeguard' talk from the RNLI beach lifeguards, who carefully explained the flag system on the beach and gave helpful tips on safer sea swimming. The children then completed a series of land based games and sea swimming activities learning about self-rescues, hazard spotting and cold water shock.

The children absolutely loved the sea swimming sessions and were already asking to go again before they walked back to school. Despite the red flag on day one, this project has been a huge success and highlighted the importance of taking care of the environment and checking that it is safe to swim. We hope to reschedule the 'swimming' part of the Year 6 day and include it within Activities Week to ensure that our Year 6 children do not miss out.

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A massive thank you to Edge Watersports, Sideshore learn to swim initiative for funding the event, Jane Hushon (Swim Devon) Mrs Rhodes for putting together the whole project and the super team here at Withycombe who worked hard behind the scenes to make this all come together.



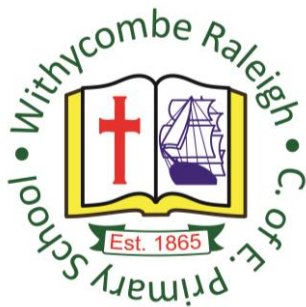

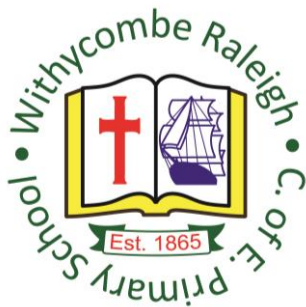

Collective Worship

This week in Collective Worship we have been focusing on what makes a community. We thought about who is a part of our school community and what we can all do to make sure everyone in our community is happy and feels valued. Sometimes, being new can make us feel like the odd one out. This week we used the story of Zaccheus to explore being the odd one out and what makes us belong.

Safeguarding: Contextual Safeguarding

Contextual safeguarding recognises that as our children grow up and develop they are influenced by a whole range of environments and people outside of their family situation.

These risks and influences could be apparent while: out and about in the local community, at a club, here at school, while out with their friends (including at a sleep-over) or when online. Children may encounter risks (these could be inter-related or multiple risks) in any of these environments.

Contextual safeguarding of children looks at how we can best understand these risks, engage with children and keep them safe. The challenges / risks that children might experience are likely to be very different for each individual, according to their age and circumstances.

In our primary school setting, we follow policies and procedures to keep our children safe. Our staff are all trained to keep children safe and respond to any concerns; we do utmost to identify and mitigate risks as early as possible.

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Educating children about how to keep safe and recognise / understand risk is part of our progressive school curriculum (particularly our RSE lessons). This week, I have also shared some 'What if' scenario cards with class teachers to use to help children verbalise or act out responses to situations associated with contextual safeguarding.

It is of course recommended that parents and carers gain a good understanding of the contextual safeguarding risks faced by their children (including young people / older siblings). Please stop and consider for a moment what you know about the risks associated with the following contexts – Their visits to the local park or shops, their visits to friends' houses or their journey to and from school. The children themselves are of course often best placed to tell you about any challenges / risks they might face in these different environments – please make time to talk to them about how they perceive these and discuss how these can be managed.

Their designs will be used on certificates and House point cards.

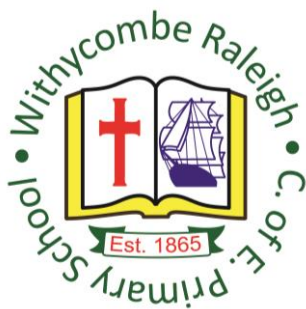


On Monday, Lapwing Class spent some time doing some drawings to celebrate the Queen's life and reign.

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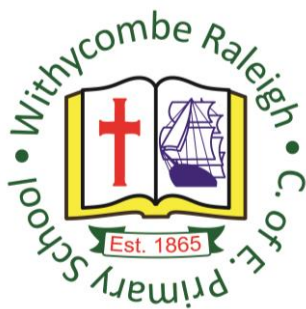
