Lateness

We've noticed that we have several children arriving late for school every day. A reminder that our school day begins at 8:40am with learning starting as soon as the children are in the classroom. If your child is just 5 minutes late each day, they will be missing 25 minutes of crucial learning each week, 5 hours of learning a term. This missed learning could have a significant impact on your child's academic progress across the year.

If there are barriers to you getting your child to school on time, please speak to myself or Mr Smith about this. We are keen to support families in any way we can to improve children's attendance and give them the very best chances to achieve in school.



"We're only a few minutes late, does it really matter?"

Being late for school means you're less prepared for the day ahead with the rest of your class, and you miss out on important learning time:

- 5 minutes late every day =
 - 3 days of learning missed a year2 weeks of learning missed a year
- 15 minutes late every day

attendance of only 75%

- over 50 lessons missed a year
- even at 95% attendance
- you'd miss 288 lessons!

Safeguarding

International Women's Day
 8th March 2024
 "Inspire Inclusion"



Statistically women and girls suffer inequality both in the UK and, more starkly, in other parts of the world. I have included a few illustrations of inequality below (compiled from various sources).

- Women are under-represented in leadership with only 28% of management positions held by women, with similarly low proportions in government.
- More than 340 million women and girls are projected to live in extreme poverty by 2030.
- Only 61% of working-age women are in employment compared to 91 per cent of working-age men. This affects both economic growth and societal progress.
- Globally, women and girls being subjected to harmful practices such as child marriage and female genital mutilation persist. One in five young women is married before the age of 18.
- Girls have inadequate access to education and health care.
- Each year, 245 million women and girls experience physical and/or sexual violence by a partner.
- Older women face higher rates of poverty and violence than older men.

On a pragmatic basis it's therefore important to understand, value and seek out the inclusion of women and girls. As a school community we aim to support all of our pupils in their personal growth and development towards becoming valued members of society. With a view on inequality, it is particularly important that we ensure the needs, interests and aspirations of our girls are constantly considered, valued and included.

At primary school age this includes:

- √ forging an early understanding of being financially independent and empowered
- empowerment not to accept or tolerate sexism or misogyny, and know how to act and who to speak to if this were to take place
- ✓ recognising and developing diverse talent in different areas and celebrating this:
 - o encouraging girls into leadership and decision-making roles,
 - o promoting STEM subjects (where women are under-represented in the workplace)
 - o providing opportunities for elevating girls' participation and achievement in sport
 - o promoting the creative and artistic talent of girls.
- ✓ helping girls to make informed decisions about their health and support, and to build their self-esteem and confidence (e.g. their perception around body image)

Rabbit Class were joined by the children from Oak class for the paired reading session. We'll share more photos on our website next week!










