

It has been a really busy week with several classes starting their new topics with an exciting visit or event. Years 5 and 6 visited the Space Dome in school as an introduction to their new topics. As a school we do really value being able to take children out to visit other places, and being able to give children rich experiences in school. We always try to keep the cost of our trips and visits affordable, in particular this year with the cost-of-living crisis impacting on families across the country. Although we want children to continue to have these enriching learning experiences, we cannot always proceed with visits without parents' and carers' financial contribution towards the cost. Trips and visits are a highlight of the children's time here with us at Withycombe – it is the experience of these which children remember long after they have left us. I really hope that we can work together to continue to provide these for children in the future. Winter has definitely arrived this week, it has been very cold on the gate each morning! Please send children to school with named hats, scarves and gloves... we have quite a collection of lost property piling up around school including several unnamed hats! Environmental News

The Big Garden Birdwatch: Friday 26 and Sunday 28 January.



This month, the RSPB are encouraging families to take part in the Big Garden Birdwatch - the world's largest garden wildlife survey. This important survey helps to build a picture of how garden birds are doing in the UK.

It's easy to be part of Big Garden Birdwatch. Simply choose an hour between 26 and 28 January and count the birds you see in your garden, balcony, or in your local park. You can sign up, download a tally chart and take part using the following link: https://www.rspb.org.uk/whats-happening/big-garden-birdwatch

Many species of birds in the UK are in decline, including those that we regard as common garden birds. The reasons for decline are varied: fewer green spaces, pollution and changing climate are just some of the challenges faced by many birds. The survey will allow a better understanding of what is happening and help to find solutions.

Helping Garden Birds:

Garden birds benefit from any extra help that we give them; our gardens are increasingly seen as places to find food, water and shelter during the winter. Actions such as feeding the birds, putting up nest boxes and wildlife-friendly gardening can make all the difference for birds' survival, especially during the winter months.

The RSPB recommend that when buying bird food, to try to get a good mix of peanuts, seeds and live food like mealworms and waxworms. Fruit, especially bruised apples and pears, will be popular with thrushes and blackbirds. Household scraps like pastry, cooked rice and breadcrumbs should only be offered in small amounts occasionally.

You can also help stop the spread of avian disease by removing old food and cleaning your bird tables, bird baths and feeders weekly. Further information can be found here: https://www.rspb.org.uk/birds-and-wildlife/helping-birds-and-wildlife

I put a bird feeder in my small garden about 3 years ago. I've been lucky to encourage lots of different visitors including Carrion Crows, Magpies and lots of small birds like the very friendly male Blackbird who yells at me if I'm late refilling the seed tray! Most days I also see a pair of robins, some long-tailed tits which arrive as a big group (they seem to have adopted a great tit as one of their family as it always arrives with them), blue tits, reed warblers, coal tits, dunnocks, and sometimes a very shy wren.

I put out sunflower hearts, fat slabs, a seed mix, nuts, and mealworms. I also have a small pond and they drink from it.

The Longest Walk – where are we? Krasnoyarsk! Which is the largest city and administrative centre of Krasnoyarsk Krai, Russia. It is the second-largest city in Siberia after Novosibirsk, with a population of over 1.1 million. Krasnoyarsk is an important junction of the renowned Trans-Siberian Railway, and is one of the largest producers of aluminium in the country. January is the coldest month, with the temperature often reaching an average high of -14.4°C and an average low of -21.4°C.

Foundation Literacy Inspired Art

Over the last two weeks the children in EYFS have been learning the story of 'Mr Gumpy's Outing'. It tells of a kind man, called Mr Gumpy, who agrees to take a little girl and boy - along with an array of animals! - out on his boat for a day-trip.

The children have loved looking at the illustrations in this book. They have used the pictures, along with discussions about the key features of different types of animals, to draw a character from the story and then colour-washed their drawing with paint.

We think they have done a fantastic job!



Year 4 had a fantastic Anglo Saxon experience day at Wildwood, Escot.

We learnt about Anglo Saxon lives and were able to try out some of the Anglo Saxon skills,
using authentic replica tools, grinding flour to make bread, chiselling away at the mallet and foraging for
food (eating stinging nettles). Even though it was cold, we all really enjoyed it!

This session consolidated their learning from the Autumn term whilst learning about the exciting new projects happening in space right now!
